Bird Banding Demonstration

•Sunday, December 4

Reminder: PVAS' 14th annual bird banding demonstration will be hosted by expert, Bob Dean, in Hedgesville, WV, from 1:00-4:00 pm. This is an enjoyable and educational event. You'll see common backyard birds close up and learn about them. It's also a great opportunity to socialize and meet others with similar interests and enjoy the refreshments provided.

The event is held outdoors, so those planning to attend should dress accordingly.

Directions: From I-81 north or south take exit 20 and follow Rte 901 west for about 2 miles to the first stop sign. Turn left and go 0.2 miles to Harlan Springs Road. Turn left onto Harlan Springs and go .7 miles to Limestone Lane (across from stone spring house and large pond). Turn right on Limestone and go 0.3 miles to parking sign in field below the house.

From Route 9 west of Hedgesville, stay on Rte 9 till just before the exit to I-81. Turn left on Harlan Springs Road. Go 1.25 miles on Harlan Springs to spring house and pond on your left. Turn left onto Limestone Lane and park in the field below the house.

Blackwater National Wildlife Refuge

•Saturday and Sunday, January 28-29

PVAS will lead a field trip to the Blackwater National Wildlife Refuge (BNWR) and other birding "hot spots" near Cambridge on Maryland's Eastern Shore on the weekend of January 28-29. If participants are interested in doing a weekend trip, we'll do that (probably spending Saturday night in Cambridge, MD). Otherwise, we will do just a day trip. You will need to sign up prior to the trip. This trip is a fantastic opportunity to see winter residents as well as a diversity of wintering waterfowl. The snow goose population can number in the tens of thousands. The BNWR also has the greatest nesting density of bald eagles in the eastern United States north of Florida and we are sure to see a number of these magnificent birds. With luck, we might also see Golden Eagles, which are frequently sighted at the refuge. •Sunday, February 12

PVAS' great birders Lynne Wiseman, Tess England, and Bruni Haydl will again lead us on this popular birding trip (formerly known as the Waterfowl on the Shenandoah River field trip). Birding beginner or just curious? Come on out-- this one's for you! One year we had an eruption of Red-necked Grebes, and last year, there was a beautiful barred owl snoozing the afternoon away in a sycamore tree, just where Bruni told us to look!

We will meet at Bakerton Road off Route 340, just west of Harpers Ferry National Park on the broad (west) side of the road. The speaker for our January meeting is Dr. John Rappole, who will talk about his recently published book, "Birds of the Mid-Atlantic Region and Where to Find Them." The book is a comprehensive guide to bird life in our area and directs readers to public sites where each species can be found.

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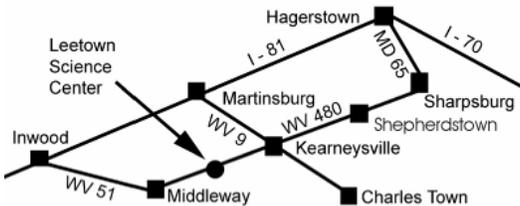
