PVAS Works to Bring WV Master Naturalist Training Program to Area

PVAS has begun discussions with state officials and others about sponsoring local training for individuals who wish to participate in the West Virginia Master Naturalist program. This training could be offered as early as this fall.

One of the first in the nation, the West Virginia Master Naturalist program is patterned after the 33-year-old Master Gardener Program. It is aimed at allowing individuals to increase their understanding and appreciation of the natural world while helping their communities and the environment. Participants receive classroom and field training in a broad range of topics in the fields of natural history and environmental education. Those who complete 64 hours of training and 30 hours of volunteer work are certified as Master Naturalists.

Once certified, these individuals help construct and maintain nature trails, lead interpretive walks at state parks, assist biologists with research, and give presentations to school children and other groups.

West Virginia's Master Naturalist program is a project of the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources, the West Virginia University Extension Service, the Canaan Valley Institute, Davis and Elkins College, and the West Virginia Division of Tourism.

- Friday, June 23rd, 7:00 PM at NCTC. Robert Tope, Managing Editor of Nature's Best magazine will deliver a presentation about how to prepare for a photographic competition (e.g., what judges look for and how to increase your chances of winning).
- Friday, July 28th, 7:00 PM at NCTC. Wil Hershberger will provide a practical "nuts and bolts" presentation about how to prepare and present photographic prints for photo competition.
- Friday, August 18th, 7:00 PM at NCTC. Tony Sweet will provide a free, one hour program about his unique approach to photography. Tony Sweet was recently named by Nikon as one of their Legends Behind the Lens. He will conduct a day-long seminar in the Robert Byrd Auditorium at the National Conservation Training Center in Shepherdstown on the following day, Saturday, August 19, from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM. Tickets for this day-long event are \$90 for PVNP members and \$100 for nonmembers. The seminar should appeal to beginner, intermediate, and advanced photographers alike. It will include sessions on compositional technique, the equipment he uses, and digital workflow tips and techniques. He'll show and provide both the creative and technical details behind many of his beautiful images. The seminar will conclude with a critique of images that have been submitted by attendees, along with a question and answer session.




